February/March 2008

Our second AGM was successfully held on Sunday 24 February with 15 members attending. See overleaf for a summary of the meeting. After the business part of the meeting, we enjoyed a shared buffet lunch. We then had an auction of the paintings which Brian had donated (again, see overleaf for details). The afternoon session was a double act of Brian and Feng Li. We split into 2 groups – calligraphy or paper folding – and spent a really enjoyable 1½ hours on each subject. Some members enjoyed the activity so much that they chose to repeat the activity instead of moving on!



Feng Li, accompanied by her adorable daughters, gave us an excellent workshop in paper folding. This is the same as Japanese origami. We had great fun making a shirt, a pair of trousers, a camera and a butterfly out of brightly coloured papers. Feng Li was very organised and had all the papers ready for us along with samples of what we had to achieve. This was great fun!

Feng Li also showed us lovely examples of her paper cutting – something that we could do in the future, maybe?

Brian gave us an excellent workshop on calligraphy and paid special attention to showing us how to write calligraphy that would be suitable for our paintings. He gave much needed individual attention ensuring that we could write the strokes in an accurate way. He also showed us an easy way of ensuring that we write the calligraphy in the appropriate size and evenly by cutting a window in paper and leaving space to practice the characters nearby.



Calligraphy as bamboo

Brian brought a page of 1000 characters written by the Emperor Tai Zong in about 630 AD to inspire (frighten?) us! This is a stone rubbing. He also showed us an example of calligraphy being written in the form of bamboo as a secret message. He spent time discussing with us how to combine characters that would be suitable according to the subject of our paintings. The handouts that he gave us of a selection of characters will be treasured by us all.

Famous Artists of China - Wang Ming Fang

Wang Ming Fang is one of China's finest freestyle bird and flower painters, and is well known throughout the country.

A native of Xian, he was born in 1960. From childhood he deeply loved drawing, and even the Cultural Revolution did not deter him. In 1980 he was lucky to have the famous flower and bird painter Zhang Hao as his teacher.

Wang Ming Fang was always very industrious, and he took his studies seriously. Even today he regularly goes back to Nature, and does many sketches. It is this diligence that has given his work a rare reality.

He has spent many years also as a teacher of art, in schools of all grades, and he admitted to me that he gained much from the observations of children. He is a teacher in the prestigious Xian Institute of Art, and he holds many private exhibitions. He has won many national prizes, including one in an international painting and calligraphy competition.

Wang Ming Fang is constantly developing his art, and his birds, though appearing like caricatures, are very realistic in their poses. It was he who introduced me to his friend, the Minister for Culture for Shaanxi, at his home in Banpo. It was the Minister who personally asked me to help their local artists. This I have tried to do.

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Brian's Calligraphy Corner

Chinese Calligraphy 5

The New Year

The Chinese year 2008 is signified by the following combination, spoken as **Wu Zi**. This is the present year in the traditional 60 year cycle, beginning at the New Year in the lunar calendar.

The Golden Knife Stroke


This is a very common but difficult stroke in Chinese characters.

It is painted from top to bottom. Start with the tip of the brush, and turn the upper end of the stroke. Then go downwards with quickly increasing pressure, as shown by the fat part of the red line. Towards the bottom reduce pressure fairly quickly, and trace the edge of the foot of the character with the tip of the brush, finally finishing with slight increase of pressure on the upward return.

It can be painted by other methods, but I find this one more reliable.

Notes from the AGM

Full Minutes of the meeting will be prepared by Sandra for handing out at the AGM in 2009 so meanwhile here are the main points that arose:

- The Group is in a healthy financial position with a balance of about £2000 (less some outgoings still to be accounted for).
- It was agreed to increase the number of Committee members to 4.
- The current members of the committee and the officers were re-elected.
- Bob Perkin and Dorothy Pickering agreed to accept nominations to the Committee. (Dorothy had to decline but will be willing to assist as needed. There is now a vacancy.)
- It was voted by majority decision to increase the subscription to the Group by £2.50 for 2009. This means that postal membership will be £10 pa and email membership will be £7.50.
- The Group numbered 74 members during 2007 of whom 42 accepted communication by email.
- During the ensuing discussion, several members offered their assistance at the national AGM. These offers were gratefully accepted. Only members of the national Society will be able to attend the actual AGM but all members of our Group will be welcome as helpers and will be welcome at the workshop following the meeting and at the workshop on the Sunday.

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Brian sent me the following snippet of information:

At the Opening of China in Yorkshire, I was asked to do the calligraphy slot. Of course the Chinese people were curious, so some of them tried to play a game/trick on me. They wrote a character, upside down to me, and asked how many strokes before I identified it. Here, I had just identified his name in 4, then Chun, Spring, in 2. So he gave up trying. Well done, Brian! Anne



This is a fantastic display of lanterns (like those that we made with Brian). On 1 March, Brian was organising a display of lanterns assembled by the local Chinese children in a floating display on water in Clifton Park, Rotherham. Events at Harewood House

This is a synopsis of some of the events that are taking place in 2008.

 $15\ March-2\ November-Harewood\ House$ is celebrating a long standing connection with the arts of China.

The famous Chinese wallpaper dating from 1769 which was found in a storeroom at Harewood House in 1988, has been hung in the East Bedroom. On Monday 31 March, Melissa Gallimore (Curator and Project Manager of the East Bedroom refurbishment and a member of our Group) will lead a tour of the East Bedroom. Fee - £14.50

15 March - 2 November - Chinoiserie at Harewood - see the beautiful Chinese, Indian and European, in the Chinoiserie style, objects collected by the Lascelles family during the 18^{th} century and now displayed in the exhibition rooms next door to the refurbished East bedroom.

Sat 17 May and Sun 18 May 10.15 am - 1 pm. Flying High - construct a Chinese 3 stick kite - Malcolm Goodman Fee - £4.

17 May - 3 August - Exhibition of work by Hong Kong based artists Fiona Wong and Wilson Shieh.

Saturday 7 June – The Harewood Dragon Boat festival. As well as the Dragon Boat race there will be lantern-making, paper crafts, tai chi demonstrations, traditional Unicorn dances and much more.

Monday 9 June 2008 – Chinese Calligraphy – Mary Tang 10 am – 2 pm. Fee - £24.50.

6 July – Chinese Culture Day – celebrate the sights, sounds and smells of Chinese food, culture and craft. Cookery demonstrations, musicians and performances.

These are just some of the exhibitions and workshops that are planned for 2008. All the events have limited numbers, so you advised to book early.
